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HISTORY OF

PERCOMOnline Inc. and PERCOM EMS Medical Education Consortium

PERCOM was Established 2007

PERCOMOnline Inc. began enrolling its first EMS education students in 2008 as a hybrid online program utilizing online formats for the didactic portion of the education, utilized and contracted skills sites for students (to choose from) for skills practice and testing, and then completion of clinical and field rotations in a more traditional format (but with more location choices) than the average EMS education program. The program structure is designed to make EMS education more available to potential students who (typically) need more non-traditional methods to achieve the education needed to be eligible to be certified. This format development has been underway since 2008 by Jane E. Dinsmore (B.S., NRP, Licensed Paramedic), William E. Gandy (B.S., NRP, Licensed Paramedic) and a few other highly skilled EMS professionals who saw the need for alternative pathways in EMS education years ago. Together we have worked to achieve what PERCOMOnline offers EMS professionals today.

In 2009, PERCOMOnline enrolled its first Intermediate/AEMT students and then in 2010, the state of Texas approved PERCOMOnline to enroll and educate Paramedic students. Shortly after, Texas opted to require CAAHEP accreditation for all Paramedic programs operating and licensed in Texas, so we began the process of seeking that accreditation. With a strong Consortium agreement, "PERCOM EMS Medical Education Consortium" now oversees the Paramedic portion of the program. In September 2012, PERCOM achieved its initial goal and gained CAAHEP accreditation for our Paramedic program, which continues.

Since that time, we have continued to proudly evolve, change, and prosper.

Steps to Enrollment

Getting Started

Below is an overview of steps to follow to get started at PERCOM.

- **Select Course** - To begin enrollment into a course you first must select a tuition option for the desired course. Once the payment is sent, the student will have access to complete the application to enroll.
- **Application** - To complete enrollment, you will need an unofficial high school diploma or equivalent, a government issued ID and American Heart Association BLS or HCP CPR card. Paramedic students will need to submit an National Registry EMT card or a Texas EMT Certification.
- **Background Check** - It is PERCOM's admission policy that every student enrolling into the EMT, Advanced EMT or Paramedic course will complete a background check prior to receiving course access. This check normally takes three to five business days. To learn about what may exclude you from entering the program look at the admissions policy in the Student Handbook.
- **Placement Testing** - Complete the EMS Testing profile setup after purchasing enrollment codes and textbooks in order to take the pre-assessment test covering Math, English and Reading Comprehension.

- **Course Access Email** - Once all documents have been confirmed and the background check has been returned, an email will be sent to you to introduce you to the course and your instructor.

General Requirements

Potential students who wish to enroll in EMT, P1/AEMT or Paramedic must meet the following requirements to be eligible to complete enrollment.

- * Review and be able to perform the TDSHS Functional Job Description for each level indicated in the document. Students who have documented disabilities which might preclude them from being able to perform one or more items in the Functional Job Description must produce acceptable documentation with recommendations from a licensed healthcare professional in the appropriate field for review and consultation with the Program Director and Lead Medical Director of the program. Reasonable accommodations will be met that are accepted by both state and national licensing and accrediting authorities for the EMS professions.
- * Pass a background check which includes but is not limited to a county/parish, state, national and/or international criminal history, sex offender history, healthcare fraud and abuse (GSA/SSA), and U.S. Patriot Act. Any "hits" on the background check will be forwarded for review and approval or denial to the Program Director, who may include the Clinical Coordinator and...

...Medical Director in the approval process as indicated.

*Must be at least 18 years of age (or will be 18 years of age prior to course completion of the EMT course).

Applicants who are not at least 18 years of age at time of enrollment must have all agreements, statements, and contracts co-signed by parent or legal guardian. Not all clinical and field sites will allow students below the age of 18 into their sites so no guarantees for placement will be made for students under the age of 18 years.

Pre-assessment Testing

- Prospective students should read and understand the Functional Job Description before entering the program.
- Students cannot be discriminated against because of a disability in the offering of the education program.
- There can be NO accommodation during screening tests or course testing that will compromise or fundamentally alter the testing of knowledge or skills that are required to function safely in the profession. The following are examples in which no accommodation can be given.

applying for re-admittance due to failure of maintaining the required course average or failing final exam are subject to evaluation by a Readmission Committee. If the Program Director/Medical Director determines that a student shall appear before the Readmission Committee, the following shall be considered before readmission is granted.

- Attendance/Participation
- Attitude and Behavior
- Average Daily and Quiz Grades
- General Adherence to Policy/Procedures
- Overall Comprehension of Material

The Readmission Committee will be made up of one of the student's peers, one instructor, one field paramedic, the Coordinator/Program Director and a member of the program's Medical Director's team. All decisions are final and not subject to appeal. Any student who must drop out of the course for personal reasons may be admitted to the next offered class, space permitting. Readmitting students will take second priority to initial enrolling students. If a student is readmitted, all tuition and fees will be due as before. There will be no application of previous funds to a future course. All initial requirements will be required of readmitting students.

Re-admission

Any student who fails an initial course may be admitted to the next offered class, space permitting. However, online students who fail a PERCOM course should consider re-attempting their educational goals with a more traditional school or program. Students who are

Advanced Placement

For this reason, EMT's are expected to complete a Training Program that meets National and State standards. PERCOM offers an online self-paced hybrid course with a deadline of six months. The course consists of three separate components; Didactic, Psychomotor Skills and Clinical.

PREREQUISITES

To be eligible for entry into the EMT course, the applicant must be 18 years of age, provide proof of high school diploma or GED, and hold/maintain an AHA BLS CPR for Healthcare Providers Card {only provider accepted}.

COURSEWORK

PERCOM hosts all its course work on <https://www.percomcourses.com>. However, exams are administered through [Emstesting.com](https://www.emstesting.com). Course work begins upon enrollment with the assessment test and pretest. After being accepted students will see the full course load for the program and are asked to start at the top and work their way to the final exam at the bottom.

Course Instructors host weekly chat rooms covering scenarios, Q&As and advanced topics. Course requirements have students attend two chatroom sessions and encourage attending as often as possible. COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Other skills will be included over and above those listed here for practice and learning purposes. Students will also be required to utilize these skills correctly and appropriately and EMT level skills in scenario/simulation practice. This process is designed to help the student "run the call" as well as step into the role of advanced level team leader, putting it all together.

Students will be required to demonstrate minimum competencies on these specific skills and perform them correctly and appropriately during individual and summative scenario-based type testing to pass the P1 Skills Testing Session and prior to being released to practice under the auspices and oversight of preceptors in the Clinical and Field Experience phase (Rotations) for AEMT level.

Students who are enrolled as Paramedic students who are not planning to test NREMT AEMT will still be required to complete these sessions (unless otherwise placed through Advanced Placement to skip straight to P1 Skills Testing). All sessions must be completed in order - P1 Practice Session 1, P1 Practice Session 2, and then P1 Skills Testing. Students are not allowed to RSVP or attend them out of this sequence.

PERCOM offers an online self-paced hybrid course with twenty months to complete. The course consists of two terms with three separate components in each term; Didactic, Psychomotor Skills and Clinical.

PREREQUISITES

To be eligible for entry into the Paramedic course, the applicant must have a National Registry EMT card or State of Texas EMT Certification. 18 years of age, provide proof of high school diploma or GED, and hold/maintain an AHA BLS CPR for Healthcare Providers Card {only provider accepted}. A&P is a pre/co- requisite. P2 students also must complete AHA ACLS and PALS, PHTLS or BTLS (or equivalent) from outside providers and produce certifications prior to P2 Final Exam. Paramedic also encompasses successful completion of both P1 and P2.

Other skills will be included over and above those listed here for practice and learning purposes. Students will also be required to utilize these skills correctly and appropriately and EMT level skills in scenario/simulation practice. This process is designed to help the student "run the call" as well as step into the role of advanced level team leader, putting it all together.

Students will be required to demonstrate minimum competencies on these specific skills and perform them correctly and appropriately during individual and summative scenario-based type testing to pass the P1 Skills Testing Session (and designated P2 didactic work) prior to being released to practice under the auspices and oversight of preceptors in the Clinical and Field Experience phase (Rotations). Students who are enrolled as Paramedic students will be required to complete all the P1 and P2 sessions (unless otherwise placed through Advanced Placement to skip straight to P1 Skills Testing and possibly P2 Skills Testing).

All sessions must be completed in order - P1 Practice Session 1, P1 Practice Session 2, P1 Skills Testing, P2 Practice Session 1, P2 Practice Session 2, P2 Practice Session 3 and finally P2 Skills Testing. Students are not allowed to RSVP or attend them out of this sequence.

Near or by the end of Final Field Internship, the student will be required to take and pass a Paramedic Graduate Interview with a member of the Medical Director's team and a video submission of the Final Skills Summative Exam. Up to two attempts are allowed for each exam.

Shortly after completion of ALL requirements, a Course Completion Certificate will be issued, and you will be marked clear to test NREMT.

GENERAL PROCEDURES AND POLICIES

Attendance Policy

100% attendance is essential for successful course completion. Absences will be excused only for good cause, at the sole and exclusive discretion of the instructor. No absence will be excused unless the instructor has been notified before class, except in cases of emergency.

Online students MUST log in to the course weekly to remain in the course. (Even students in rotations who have completed coursework through Final Exam must continue to follow this policy as “roll call” for attendance purposes.) This is MANDATORY and students who are not meeting this requirement may be dropped from the course without notice.

Students who are dropped for not meeting the mandatory participation requirement listed herein may reinstate within 6 months of the date of drop. However, a Reinstatement Fee will ensue.

Students may not be allowed to “reinstate” after 6 months and will be required to pay full tuition and begin coursework at the beginning.

Students must submit homework, testing, or an e-mail to the lead instructor as well as attend all mandatory chat rooms or forum discussions (unless excused for good cause in advance by the lead instructor) or the student will be dropped from the program for non-participation.

Students who have dropped themselves from the program may apply for readmission within 6 months of the course drop date.

Students who are readmitted will be charged a Reinstatement Fee.

Some Points of the ADA

- Prospective students should read and understand the Functional Job Description before entering the program.
- Students cannot be discriminated against based on a disability in the offering of the education program.
- There can be NO accommodation during screening tests or course testing that will compromise or fundamentally alter the testing of knowledge or skills that are required to function safely in the profession. The following are examples in which no accommodation can be given.

Requesting Accommodation

Leave of Absence Policy (Voluntary Suspension)

A student may request a leave of absence (also known as "voluntary suspension") from the EMT, Intermediate, or Paramedic Program. A leave of absence will only be granted when documentation is submitted to the Program Director attesting to a medical or family emergency and will be granted for no more than 90 days. An approved leave of absence will allow the student to re-enter the program without penalty if the program director is notified and re-enters the program within the period granted by A student may reenter the program after the period of absence approved by the program director if within 180 days after deadline but may be required to pay an administrative fee to have their student files reinstated. Students attempting to reenter the program after 180 days must typically re-enroll and pay all tuition and fees required of new applicants. Military members with valid deployment orders may request reentry following return. Approval for a leave of absence (voluntary suspension) is decided by the Program Director on a case-by-case basis. Requests are reviewed individually for approval. A student is required to have maintained satisfactory academic and clinical standards to be eligible for the leave of absence.

Refund Policy (for all except EMS Instructor Course - see website for details)

From seven days of the date of purchase a full refund minus a \$ 250.00 application fee. From the seventh day of the assigned course access date to the fourteenth day, a refund of 50% is applicable. Following the last hour on the fourteenth day a student is no longer eligible for a refund. A 3% service fee is deducted from all refunds. See the Refund Policy on the course website or in the Student Handbook for further information.

Student Withdrawal Policy

Students who wish to voluntarily withdraw from the program must message or email the Program Director to initiate the withdrawal. Withdrawal requests must be received by the Program Director before the final deadline date specified for that student based on the course access date and deadline dates documented on the course roster. All withdrawals are subject to the Refund Policy, which was distributed during enrollment and is posted in the Policies section of the percomcourses.com website. Students in good standing behaviorally and academically who voluntarily withdraw from the program are eligible for reinstatement for up to 6 months from the "drop date" posted on the course roster. Students who reinstate will be required to pay a reinstatement fee and reset the payment plan (if any) and make a payment as designated by the Payments Manager if applicable. The Program Director will reinstate the student to the program without further financial or academic penalty and reset the course deadline(s) based on the amount of time the student has already been in the program and how long the student was out of the program. Students who do not notify the Program Director and return within 6 months of the withdrawal or drop will be treated as a new enrollee/student both academically and financially.

PROCEDURES AND POLICIES

Students may choose to take a voluntary suspension rather than formally withdraw from the program for up to six months from the time of the suspension date. During this time, the student may choose to continue payments, if on a payment plan, or request that payments also be suspended until student returns before the designated deadline.

To return, the student must message or email the Program Director to request to return and reset the payment plan (if any) and make a payment as designated by the Payments Manager if applicable.

The Program Director will reinstate the student to the program without further financial or academic penalty and reset the course deadline accordingly and to an appropriate date based on the amount of time the student has already been in the program and how long the student was out on suspension.

Students who do not notify the Program Director and return before the designated deadline for the voluntary suspension will be treated as a new enrollee/student both academically and financially.

Student Drop/Removal Policy

Each student enrolled in a PERCOM course or program has a responsibility to meet the deadlines as listed in the policy above. This means students must stay on track so that the course or program can be completed on time or before the stated deadlines.

Students must also follow the mandatory weekly course login Participation Policy demonstrating that the student is moving forward and working on the coursework in a progressive fashion.

Students may be either dropped or removed from the program for non-participation or not meeting didactic or overall deadlines.

A “Removed Not 10%” means that a student has not completed a designated amount of coursework consistent with having completed 10%.

A “Drop” is utilized if the student is being dropped for non-participation, bypassing deadlines without extensions or self-request but the student HAS completed at least 10% of the coursework.

The student may request to be reinstated ONCE after being dropped or removed and the course access date and deadlines will be reset but will be required to pay a reinstatement fee. If the student is dropped or removed again, reinstatement may be denied.

If the reinstatement request is greater than 6 months after the drop or removal, the request will typically be denied, and the student will be required to re-enroll and start over academically and financially as a new student.

GLOSSARY

EMT: (short for "Emergency Medical Technician") A specially trained medical technician certified to provide basic emergency services (as cardiopulmonary resuscitation) before and during transportation to a hospital.

Advanced EMT: An Emergency Medical Technician who has received advanced training to provide minimal advanced life support (ALS); usually works under direct medical control. A minimum level of certification to staff an ALS ambulance in some states.

Paramedic: An Emergency Medical Technician who has received advanced training to provide advanced life support (ALS) up to and including advanced Pharmacology and various other advanced treatments and procedures; usually works under direct medical control. A minimum level of certification to staff an ALS ambulance in some states.

Adult Methods of Teaching: A course designed to meet the latest national EMS instructional standards and prepare students for instructing in the EMS environment.

Challenge Exam: An opportunity given to a pre-qualified EMT to attempt the a course final exam and psychomotor exam. Used for "advanced placement".

Clinical Rotation: hours, contact types and skills to be completed in a specific department in a hospital.

Field Experiences: Hours, contact types, and skills to be completed at a Fire department or EMS house.

Final Field Internship: Final phase of Paramedic rotations requiring Team Leads in the EMS environment.

Exit Session: Skills Practice and Testing on EMT level skills and competencies.

Practice and Testing Labs: Skills Practice and Testing on all P1 or P2 level skills and competencies.

Course Completion Certificate (CCC): Documents issued by email attachment once all requirements are completed and graded from didactic, skills and rotations and Medical Director graduation approval has been granted.

Course Deadline: Date by which all coursework, skills and rotations must be completed.

Didactic Deadline: Date by which a student should be complete with all coursework and final exam.

Graduate Interview: Final interview with a member of the Medical Director's team for Paramedic students. Students must pass to pass the program.
